It is a highly contagious viral and deadly disease affecting domestic pigs and wild boars. It can be transmitted through:

It cannot be transmitted to humans nor pose a threat to our health



National Zoning and Movement Plan for the Prevention and Control of ASF by the Department of Agriculture (DA)

Red (Infected) Zone Municipalities/Cities with confirmed outbreaks Pink (Buffer) Zone ASF is not detected but is immediately around the Red Zone (i.e. NCR) Yellow (Surveillance) Zone ASF is not detected but is adjacent to Pink Zone

Light Green (Protected) Zone ASF is not detected; moderate-risk areas Dark Green (Free) Zone ASF is not detected; low-risk areas

Support Local

Support our local hog raisers by patronizing pinov pork! Just make sure to check for certification from the National Meat Inspection Service (NMIS) or compliant seal from the Food and Drug Administration (for processed products).

Wash and Cook Thoroughly

Make sure to wash and cook pork thoroughly.



Wash Hands

Always wash your hands before and after handling fresh/processed pork.



Don't Carry Pork

Avoid carrying pork products to and from countries/municipalities/ cities.

Report cases

Most importantly, report any suspicious hog deaths to vour local government unit.

Respect biosecurity

Follow biosecurity measures when visiting hog farms (i.e. use of footbaths and gears, change clothes, etc.). Do not visit farms in affected areas to avoid spreading ASF virus.



Dispose Properly

Observe proper disposal of pork leftovers. Don't throw them in bodies of water. where they may contaminate other farms' water source.

Avoid Wild Boars

Avoid direct or indirect contact with wild boars. especially for your safety.



Don't feed swill

Refrain from swill feeding, or feeding of pigs with food wastes, including cooked, raw, or processed scraps.
